Who Is Your Master?

o one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money." Matthew 6:24 (ESV) Our society is so focused on our freedoms that sometimes we fail to remember that we are all servants. I do not mean that in the earthly sense of the word but spiritual. Sometimes it seems that we fall into a similar mindset as the first century Jews in John 8:33 when they say, "We are offspring of Abraham and have never been enslaved to anyone. How is it that you say, "You will become free"?" They misunderstood what Jesus was saying. He was not talking about physical bondage or slavery but spiritual (v. 31-32). The truth of the matter is, we all serve someone. This is the very point Jesus is making in Matthew 6:24.

The only two options are sin or righteousness. Throughout scripture we see two opposing forces, Satan, and God. While Satan is not as powerful as God, God has allowed him to work in this world setting up the traps and snares of sin (Eph. 6:11, 2 Cor. 2:11). This presents men with a choice. Will we follow God or Satan? Ultimately these are the only two masters one can choose to serve. Again, as Jesus pointed out, it is either one or the other.

The question then arises how do we know which one we are serving? None of us are perfect right? Does that mean each time we sin we become a servant to Satan again and we are constantly changing masters? No. Read 1 John 3:8, "Whoever makes a practice of sinning is of the devil, for the devil has been sinning from the beginning. The reason the Son of God appeared was to destroy the works of the devil." The key word in this verse is "practice". There is a vast difference between committing a sin and practicing a sin. One is a momentary lapse in judgment, or a mistake made in weakness that is then repented of. The other is a habitual action that is not repented of. Paul makes a similar point in Romans 6:16.

When you look at your life, are you presenting yourself as an instrument of righteousness or sin? We all must serve someone. Who are you serving?
